## Stop the Violence, Right Now!



- Organizing a Discussion, Forum or Workshop on this topic at every National Gathering of Blacks Catholics during 2012-2013. We have some tremendous organizations who have the heart of our people as the center of the AGENDA. Let's utilize the spiritual and relational strength we have among ourselves and... Wake up, Rise up and Do something.
- \* Proposing and Utilizing Family Strategies of "A Helping Hand Up" during Family Reunions and Summer Outings. This may result in establishing a family emergency fund treasury, scholarships, special prayer and counseling circles. We can do it!
- Going down in prayer, because prayer changes things and people too.

Let's make up our minds and seek wisdom and strength from our God to do what only we can do for the future of our people. Too many of us have cried tears and felt the pain. Let's lean on the Lord, for scripture says... "The Lord is my rock and my salvation, whom shall I fear? In the times of trouble, He will hide me, whom shall I fear? Trust in the Lord, and He shall strengthen me" (paraphrase of Psalm 27).

IBTH 8000 PASTORAL LEADERSHIP IN BLACK & MULTICULTURAL PARISHES One Week Seminar: Degree Program (1 sem. hr credits)

This one week degree seminar for <u>priests and pastors</u> explores theological and practical pastoral issues that arise in the dynamics of pastoring in Black or multicultural Catholic parishes. Clergy from diverse cultural backgrounds engaged in Catholic ministry in the Black Community are the envisioned participants for this seminar. It is an ideal place for missionaries and cross-cultural ministers to begin to study the historical and cultural realities of Black Catholics in the local Roman Catholic Church in the United States.

#### This course will include:

Comprehensive analysis of pastoral skills and development from a black cultural perspective of the U.S. black religious experience, history and theology. In addition, the development of church programs, working with groups and councils and effective means of administering church activities are discussed.

A learning experience with Black pastors and others, who pastor in congregations where Black Catholics are present in any number to share, discuss and respond to challenges and obstacles in pastoring in the Black and multicultural Catholic communities.

Emphasis is placed upon an assessment of your ministry past, present and future as well as developing a body of knowledge and analytic skills that will enable pastors to deepen their understanding of traditional and contemporary models of pastoring in the Black and multicultural Catholic communities.

This course is designed for the experienced or "seasoned" preacher who has an operative understanding of the theology and process of preaching. The singular purpose of the course is, through class sessions, to assist preachers in integrating their understanding of how the Word speaks to them as they strive to convey the Word of God in their unique pastoral settings. The course helps each preacher explore his unique persona and personal spirituality; the presumption is that no two preachers are alike. Participants will be invited to find their "own voice" in preaching while appreciating the prayer life and spirituality of the local parish. By the end of this one-week course, priests and deacons should be secure in being themselves in the pulpit as well as developing a plan for continuing to build their communication skills in the future.
